Dear Parents/Carers,

I'm sure we all benefited from the Bank Holiday this week linked to The Queen's funeral. Thank you to the pupils involved in the book of condolences and hopefully you had the opportunity to add your comment should you have chosen to do so. This week, Miss Jones, who leads on History, held a whole-school assembly providing more of the historical context around the succession of Charles III. She also outlined some linked activities that pupils will be engaged with this week in school.

We always start the year with a full governing board meeting in which we confirm all the various governor posts. We do this year have a **new Chair of Governors (Ben Riley)**. Matthew Lenton remains as Vice Chair. I would like to say a big thank you to Laura Hadley who had held the post of Chair of Governors for all her hard work and commitment. She does remain on our Governing Board but has relinquished her position as Chair due to her own work commitments. We do have a really active and engaged Governing Board but there are some vacancies that I will be working towards filling; one of these is a parent governor and the advert for that will be coming out separately. I do know that when we did the new Reception intake meeting that a number of parents expressed an interest in getting involved in school governance.

Mrs Whyte, one of our HLTA's on our Governing Board, has stepped down due to personal reasons after seven years of commitment.

It was great to see a number of parents sign up and engage for our **Parent Support Package meetings**. Already, the group are gelling really well, sharing their individual experiences and supporting each other with ideas and strategies. Lisa Nicholls, who is leading the course, has been very complimentary of how open all of the parents have been and how well they have supported each other.

Mrs Alam has been busy organising the **Harvest Festival** for Monday 3<sup>rd</sup> October. On this day, we will have a whole school Harvest assembly to discuss the importance of this event. We will also be collecting sealed food to donate to **The Black Country Foodbank**. The Foodbank helps vulnerable individuals and families in crisis through the provision of 3 days worth of emergency food supplies, which have a massive impact on those who need them. The organisation is dependent upon donations, especially during uncertain times. Please send any donations of sealed, in date tins or packets of food into school with your child on the above date. We will then ensure these are stored safely ready for collection from a member of staff from the Foodbank.

To support the Foodbank further we are also having a **mufti day**, where the theme is to wear anything green. This is optional, as we are aware of the difficulties the cost of living is causing to many of our families. Also, you have the choice to make any donations towards the mufti day on ParentPay and we will then send these on to the Foodbank- again this is optional. Finally, on **Monday 3<sup>rd</sup> October** after school, we will also be hosting a 'Guess the number of conkers in the jar' competition. There will be two stalls operating. One will be located outside the Reception area for KS2 parents and the other will be outside the Year 1&2 paddock gate for Early Years and KS1 parents.

Mrs Bayley has been busy working with the ECO committee planting marrows, squash, apples and many more things. This year we are having 2 'Guess the number of conkers in the jar' competitions with 6 prizes up for grabs.

The closest/correct guesses of the competition will win:

- 1<sup>st</sup> Prize a hamper of produce with a mix of Temple Meadow grown and other exotic fruits from around the world (2x)
- 2<sup>nd</sup> Closest guess- 2<sup>nd</sup> Prize Playdough set (2x)
- 3<sup>rd</sup> Closest guess- 3<sup>rd</sup> Prize Harvest themed activity book and colours (2x)

Each competition entry costs 20p and you can re-enter up to 5 times. The staff will note down your child's name and class to ensure the winner gets their prize safely. The winners will be announced in Star Assembly. The money raised will go back to the ECO committee to continue their work across school. The money collected will be cash and coins and you will need to add donations directly into the money box. Thank you for all your support.

**Pupil Parliament**—Following on from my letter regarding our new Pupil Parliament, I am really looking forward to announcing our new MPs following the secret ballot within each class. I already have a number of projects and tasks for the new Pupil Parliament to get their teeth into.

**Reception 2023 Places**—Last week, our Nursery parents will have received information on how to apply for a Reception 2023 place. If you have any queries regarding this, please contact the School Office.

**Water Bottles**—It has come to my attention that we are issuing water bottles to children on a more frequent basis. Please do ensure that your child arrives in school with their water bottle each day. Any children without a water bottle will be given a new one. This comes at a £1 charge and is allocated to parents' ParentPay account.

**Whole-School Photograph Day**—Due to unforeseen circumstances, our planned Photograph Day on Monday 26th September has been cancelled. We will communicate a new date to you when this has been rearranged.

**Lovely writing**—Please see the beautiful work from some of our Year 2 and Year 4 pupils later on in this newsletter.

**Jewellery** - Just a reminder that jewellery is not permitted in school except for stud earrings and watches. Children should not wear jewellery to school for obvious safety reasons and no jewellery can be worn for any session of P.E. (pierced earrings need to be removed by the child prior to any PE activity).

# Learning 4 Life

## Learning 4 Life—Protective Behaviours

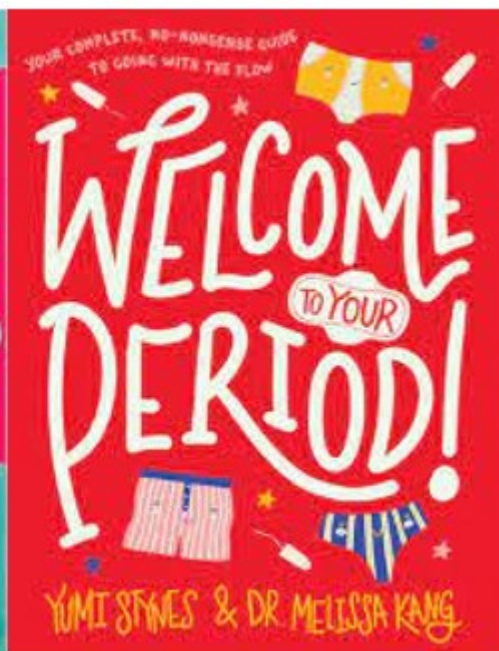
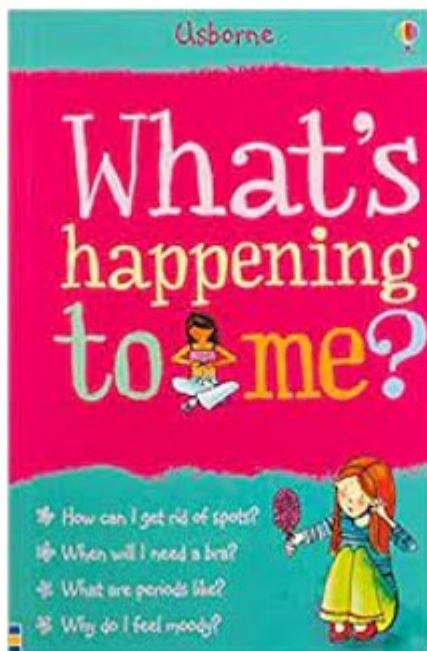
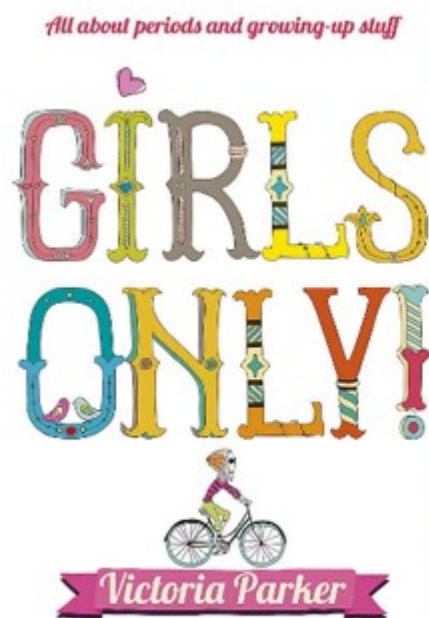
One of our Learning 4 Life units this half term is Protective Behaviours, which we teach every year and is well-embedded into our curriculum. This unit of work focuses on children being safe; knowing how to deal with unsafe issues and also having a strategy called 'Early Warnings' that they use to support themselves.

During Protective Behaviours sessions we explore children's safe networks of people that they trust who can support them with being safe and with making positive choices. Protective Behaviours also has a strong focus on children knowing and valuing their body and developing a clear understanding of the correct names for all body parts.

In line with the Science National Curriculum, staff in school will use the scientific terminology for all body parts, including genitalia (penis, vagina, anus, breasts). We encourage you to use the same terminology at home so that children become more familiar with it. This is a crucial part of our safeguarding culture at Temple Meadow as it ensures children can report injuries or concerns linked to their bodies clearly, with no ambiguity.

## Puberty books to support parents:

Linked to our Learning 4 Life (L4L) curriculum, we would like to take this opportunity to remind you that we now have a range of books in school linked to puberty and periods. These books are available for you as parents and carers to borrow should you need support explaining such changes to your children.



Should you wish to borrow one of these books, please make a request via email to [tm.admin@meadow.sandwell.sch.uk](mailto:tm.admin@meadow.sandwell.sch.uk); this will be passed on to your child's class teacher. A book will then be loaned using our library system, recorded against your child's junior librarian account and sent home discretely in an envelope to you at handover.

Please do familiarise yourself with the book and its contents before sharing with your child. The books are intended to support your own knowledge and guide any discussion with your child.

NEW WOW SCHOOL



Dear Parent/Carer

Your child's school has chosen to be part of an exciting behaviour-change initiative to encourage more children and their families to walk to school. **WOW – the walk to school challenge** is delivered by Living Streets, the UK charity for everyday walking, to help as many children as possible experience the benefits of walking to school.

The pupil-led challenge will see children self-report how they get to school every day. If they travel sustainably at least once a week for a month, they get rewarded with a badge. It's that simple!

### **What are the benefits of walking to school?**

Walking to school helps children feel happier and healthier. They arrive refreshed, healthy and ready to learn. More families walking means fewer cars on the road, helping to reduce congestion and pollution at the school gates.

### **What if we can't walk to school?**

If you live too far away or don't have time to walk the whole way to school, you can Park and Stride to help your child earn their WOW badge. Simply park or hop off public transport **at least ten minutes away** from the school and walk the remaining journey.

### **What is a WOW badge?**

There is a unique WOW badge to earn every month if you walk, wheel, cycle, scoot or Park and Stride at least once a week. Each badge has been designed by a pupil from across the UK as part of our annual WOW Badge Design Competition.

Pupils will start the year by completing a celebration of the *Wonders of the World*. From November, they will then *Walk for the World*, earning badges featuring wildlife they can help protect from climate change through sustainable travel.

The badges are made in Cornwall from repurposed plastic material that was otherwise destined for landfill, including fridge trays, plastic plates and yoghurt pot off-cuts. For more information, visit: [livingstreets.org.uk/recycling](http://livingstreets.org.uk/recycling)
