Did you know that the Americans created margarine during WWII to replace butter? Mr Taylor explained that margarine was not very tasty! He himself was not evacuated but did have to suffer the horrific feeling of an Anderson shelter (bomb shelter). Whenever an air raid was happening, a loud ear-splitting siren would activate.

At the time, he had an uncle called Walter and he had to serve as a soldier in Kenya. When the war commenced in 1939 Mr Taylor was only six years old! In the shops, you needed a rationing book to purchase items such as food and petrol (essentials for your life). Mr Taylor described his never-ending hunger as stressful and miserable since he only had a limited amount of food and drink. Thankfully in 1945, the war concluded and Mr Taylor and his family celebrated and had a street party!!!



Years Think Tank visit

On Friday 2nd December, we went to Thinktank Museum in Birmingham. The trip took half an hour to drive there on an Air shuttle coach. We went in partners in two large groups per class. To get to our first section, we had to climb about 107 stairs. Our guide to help us was named Collin. He took us to the planetarium, where we sat back for 30 minutes looking at planets, stars, the orbits of the planets and constellations. After the planetarium, we went to 'Our World'. In this section, we got to see a 160-million-year-old fossil of a crocodile, skulls of animals (including a human skull), stuffed animals and skeletons of small animals. 


